#### **Beacon**

We've had a fantastic week of learning this week! One of our most enjoyable moments was using silk fabric in dance to create abstract movements which we incorporated into a sequence of moves. In our sequences, we included circular movements such as spins and twists, varied the height and speed at which we moved and listened to the beat of a range of music to ensure we were all moving in synchronization.

In English, we are thoroughly enjoying getting our teeth into the text 'Wolf Brother'. At the moment, we are learning about the interesting vocabulary used in the story (in both wolf and human language!) as well as refining our SPAG skills by repeated practice of applying relative clauses, compound and complex sentences and cohesive devises in our writing. We have been deepening our understanding of the story by getting into character; writing diary entries explaining our thoughts, feelings and actions.

In Maths, Year 6s have continued their journey into the world of Algebra! This week, we have focussed on the difference between expressions, formulae and calculations so make sure you ask us about it! Another thing to ask about is order of operations! Year 6 can outwit anyone with their BIDMAS knowledge now! Year 5s have been concluding their learning on decimals.

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### **Alfoxton**

This week we have finished our William Morris art topic and the final pieces of work will shortly be on display. The children are very proud of the work they have achieved and are looking forward to the next topic which will involve sculpture. In English the class have been learning the model text based around the book 'Varjak Paw'. They have enjoyed creating the movements that go along with the text to help them remember it. In Science we have looked at diet and the food pyramid. The class have built their own food pyramid and learned why it is important to have a balanced diet. In History, the class have researched the similarities and differences between the rich and poor in the Victorian era. This included looking into the family home, work and school.

#### **Triscombe**

In English, Triscombe Class are enjoying reading *Coming to England* by Floella Benjamin. This week, we have learned about how Floella and her brothers and sister travelled from Trinidad to England by ship, without any parents. The children have written postcards from the perspective of Floella, to her mother, describing what it was like on the ship.

The children have continued learning about Trinidad in their topic work. We found out about the weather and seasons in Trinidad, and compared them to the weather in the UK. We agreed that the winter would be a nice time to visit the Caribbean. We have continued this theme to learn some Caribbean songs. The children really enjoyed learning to sing and perform actions to Bo Calinda, a song from Trinidad which is similar to the Hokey Cokey.

#### **Adventurers**

In Adventurers this week, Triscombe have continued the Italian theme and made fresh pasta with a tomato and vegetable sauce. They practised their chopping skills and cooked on the hob. Hopefully these are valuable skills that you can encourage and practise at home.

In Beacon, the children did Computing and French. Alfoxton are building bridges from kits prepared by Miss DH before she left. They are a real challenge so the children had to problem solve as a team to get them completed. We have lost some of our adult helpers recently due to work pressures. If you can spare two hours on a Monday afternoon we would love to see you, even if you can't do every week. The children really benefit from adult guidance as they are learning these life skills and Adventurers does not work without support. 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### **Wassail Queen**

Congratulations to Ellie on being crowned this year's Wassail Queen. Wassailing is a tradition dating back hundreds of years. The word is derived from old English 'Was-Hael' meaning Good health. Wassail celebrations traditionally take place on 12<sup>th</sup> night (Epiphany) mainly to encourage the trees to prosper but also to look forward to the longer days and hopefully warmer weather. This has become a tradition in Somerset with special features. These include the Wassail Queen, mulled cider, 'watering' the trees with cider, a loud bang (usually from a shotgun), a cacophony, songs, dancing, Morris dancers, and cider-soaked toast put amongst the twigs of the trees. This seems rather bizarre but actually makes ecological sense. Birds attracted by this treat perch, and are able to feed on insects benefitting both the tree and themselves.
