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<u>Alfoxton</u>

This week we have been learning even more about Vikings in History, using inverted commas for speech in our English work, testing different coloured overlays on our periscopes in Science, creating awesome moves in Dance and becoming masters of addition and subtraction in Maths - gosh, we have been busy!

In RE we have been thinking about the miracles Jesus performed (as written in the Bible). It made us think about how many people have experienced miracles, whether we have experienced any, and whether people really believe that all the miracles were recorded accuractely. We have learned in our History studies that the Anglo-Saxon Chronicles said that Vikings raided with fire-breathing dragons flying overhead! We wondered about the accuracy of historical stories and how additions might have come about over time. After considering our own beliefs, we reflected on the morals of well-known stories and what we can learn from them. We discovered that many of Jesus' miracles teach us about kindness and having faith in ourselves and one another. It was quite interesting!



<u>Triscombe</u>

This week in Triscombe Class, the children have been busy exploring a variety of exciting topics! In English, they created their very own dinosaur haikus, showing off their creativity and understanding of this traditional Japanese poetry form. In Maths, the children have been learning about odd and even numbers, developing a deeper understanding of number patterns and relationships.

In Science, our young learners dove into the fascinating world of insects, discovering key facts about these tiny creatures. This topic was further explored during busy learning, where the children eagerly investigated the characteristics and behaviours of different insects. In Art, they used their knowledge of primary colours and colour mixing to create vibrant prints of flowers and fruit, showcasing their artistic flair. A particular highlight of the week has been the children's enthusiasm for the trajectory maths area, where they've been engaging in hands-on activities to explore movement and angles. It's been a wonderful, action-packed week of learning for everyone!



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Preschool

This week we have started our new topic....dinosaurs. We started our topic by learning some different dinosaurs names! We all agreed some names are very difficult to pronounce for example Parasaurolophus but some are a little easier e.g Stegosaurus! We looked at similarities of dinosaurs, some have plates on their backs, spikes on their tails and very large claws and sharp teeth!

We have also celebrated the beginning of the Chinese New Year, which this year, is the year of the snake. The children have watched a short video clip explaining about Chinese New Year, made collage lanterns and used their scissor skills to cut a spiral snake. At snack time they tried some Chinese food and enjoyed a fortune cookie. We also looked to see what each of the children's names would look like, written in Chinese symbols and what the meaning of their names were. At the end of the day, they took home their own lucky red wallet containing a chocolate coin!
