Dear Parents and Carers,

It's been a brilliant week of Maths across the school, and I've thoroughly enjoyed visiting lessons and seeing the enthusiasm, focus, and fun in every classroom. It's clear that our children are not only developing strong number skills, but also growing in confidence as mathematical thinkers.

In Years 3 and 4, I was particularly impressed by the children's use of mathematical language—using words like *factor* and *product* with such accuracy and applying them when reasoning through problems. Their explanations showed real depth of understanding, and it was fantastic to hear them articulate their thinking so clearly.

Over in Reception, children were playing a wonderfully simple but effective game involving hiding cubes up to 5 and working out how many were missing. The room was filled with excitement and joyful learning as they used their number sense to solve each little mystery.

In Year 1, I saw great use of the number line beyond 10, helping children to explore and understand bridging facts in a practical and engaging way. Meanwhile, Year 2 were recalling number bonds to 20 with impressive fluency, using a clever retrieval activity involving a bird on a washing line to work out how many had "flown away." The memory and logic being used was fantastic to see.

Our Year 6 pupils have been hard at work preparing for their upcoming SATs, revisiting a wide range of topics with determination and maturity. It was great to see them applying what they've learned and rising to the challenge of revision with real focus.

And finally, I must give a shoutout to my own Year 5 group, who have been tackling improper fractions and converting them into mixed numbers, as well as multiplying fractions. Their reasoning and perseverance have been brilliant, and they've even made it fun along the way!

There's a real buzz around Maths at the moment, and it's wonderful to see children enjoying the challenge and success that comes with deepening their understanding. Thank you, as always, for supporting their learning at home—it really makes a difference. From the school, we wish you a restful Easter break and look forward to seeing you on Tuesday 22nd April.

Well, it's the last week of term and we are looking forward to taking home our Viking shields and jewellery so we can show them to our families!


Throughout the week, we've taken on the role of journalists (in our English lessons). We've learned how to interview witnesses by asking relevant questions and use the witness responses as quotes in our own newspaper reports. This all stemmed from the book we read (The Ice Palace).

In Maths, we've upped the challenge by working so hard on our 6, 7 and 9 times table at the same time! We're so much better at multiplication than Miss Day now! We've also learned some tricks to help us quickly identify if a larger number is a multiple of 3 or 6. Ask us about the digit-sum strategy!

We thought about why a bulb doesn't light up until the switch is pressed but then we realised that the circuit is broken when the switch is off. Preschool

The children have also been thoroughly engaged in playing games, such as animal dominoes and guess the noise of the animals. Ashley and I were really impressed with how they helped each other and showed great turn taking and waiting skills.

This week our phonics book has been 'Errol's garden' and we talked about what we would like to grow if we could grow anything, Strawberries was the top answer! We also read the 'Easter story' and learned about Jesus and the meaning of why we celebrate Easter.
